2.0 DISCUSSION**2.1 REGIONAL PUBLIC HEALTH (RPH) UPDATE**

Presented by Peter Gush, General Manager, Regional Public Health

Since writing the report Mr Gush advised we could expect to see some impacts over the next couple of months with winter fast approaching and the boarders opening up. RPH are now looking at how COVID is run from a national perspective and how to use the systems already in place to manage other diseases in the same way – this is a work in progress.

COMMUNITY & PUBLIC HEALTH ADVISORY COMMITTEE**PUBLIC**

New Structure – From the 1st July all staff will fall under Health NZ. The scope on what public health does has not changed at this point and the regional boundary has not changed.

Peter Gush acknowledged the support that he had received from CPHAC over a number of years. The Committee thanked and acknowledged the work that RPH has done.

RESOLVED that the Community and Public Health Advisory Committee:

- b. Notes the transition to the National Public Health Service effective 1 July 2022.

2.2 SYSTEM LEVEL MEASURES IMPROVEMENT PLAN UPDATE – REPORT FOR QUARTER 3 2021/2022

Taken as read.

- The child oral health service had been impacted by COVID-19. The staff managing that service were moved into the hospital to help out with staff shortages.
- There has been significant improvement in babies living in smokefree homes.
- From July there will be catch ups in some of these activities due to being delayed by COVID-19. There is a significant amount of business as usual activities that require catch up on including in the hospital.

RESOLVED that the Community and Public Health Advisory Committee:

1. Noted the progress made against the 2021/22 System Level Improvement Plan in Quarter Three.
2. Noted our children's oral health service has been impacted by COVID-19.
3. Noted we have achieved our target for acute bed days for Māori.
4. Noted amenable mortality rates for Māori has reduced and is below the target.
5. Noted we have seen an improvement in youth oral health coverage and exceeded the target by 23%.
6. Noted we have seen an increase in the number of babies living in smoke free homes (to 67%) and an increase to 51% for Maori.

2.3 UPDATE ON IMMUNISATION SERVICES

Report taken as read.

- The target for immunisations for our children has not been met. The DHB acknowledged that this has been affected by COVID-19. A lot of work is progressing with working with providers to increase the numbers.
- MMR – there is a lot of activity being undertaken to increase these numbers. This may see home based delivery which could cover any vaccination including COVID boosters.
- The influenza season started on 1 April 2022.
- As at 2 May the equity gap is sitting at 77%
- COVID vaccination – continuing to have all sites vaccinating - once again numbers are low.
- As at 1 May, 108,560 vaccinations had been undertaken since the beginning of the year.

RESOLVED that the Community and Public Health Advisory Committee:

1. Noted that at the end of April 2022, the immunisation coverage for Wairarapa DHB's 2 year old Total population is 86.6%; Maori 79.5% and Pacific 100%
2. Noted the MMR Immunisation campaign for 15-30 year old in the community commenced on the 3rd of May 2022. The campaign is coordinated by primary care and supported by the DHB COVID-19 vaccination workforce.
3. Noted that as at 22nd of April 2022, 34.7% of Wairarapa DHB's total population aged 65 and over received their flu vaccine, while 29.7% of Maori and 25.9% of Pacific aged 65 and over have also received their flu vaccine.
4. Noted the Covid 19 vaccination programme has seen our dose 1 rates reach 96% with 95% for dose 2 as at 1 May 2022.
5. Noted Wairarapa has vaccinated 74% of those eligible for a booster at 1 May 2022.
6. Noted we have vaccinated 51% of our five to eleven year old children as at 1 May 2022 for dose 1 and 19% for dose 2.

2.4 PACIFIC HEALTH

Presentation by Tusiga Sealiimalietoa, Director Pacific Health

An update on the Pacific Health Strategy and the actions undertaken to date plus the priorities currently being worked on was presented to the Committee. The presentation included an update on key indicators for Pacific Health.

The Pacific Strategy Plan 2020-25 was launched in 2020 – a 3DHB ongoing commitment with a collaborative approach. There are six priorities in the plan with five key principles interwoven throughout the plan.

The Director, Pacific Health acknowledged Leanne Dale (Wairarapa DHB) and Carl Brieseman (Hutt Valley DHB) for providing the data.

2.5 MĀORI HEALTH

Presentation by Jason Kerehi General Manager - Maori Health & Andrea Rutene Service Development Manager - Planning & Performance

Māori Health dashboard

A presentation on the Māori Health dashboard was received by CPHAC for their comment before the dashboard is finalised. The General Manager, Maori Health requested feedback from the Committee, at their June meeting, on what indicators/data they thought would be useful information to present going forward.

Maori Health Strategy

An update on the next steps of the Māori Health Strategy was presented to CPHAC.

The DHB is about to launch the Māori Health Strategy. This will involve a roadshow out to Wairarapa communities. The mini roadshow will visit three marae and there will also be an online hui. The Māori Health team are looking forward to presenting the strategy to key stakeholders, those front facing with whanau and to DHB teams, to share the strategy and share the priorities.

1. PURPOSE

This paper provides an update to the Committee on immunisation services.

2. IMMUNISATION

2.1 Childhood Immunisations

The immunisation coverage data obtained from Qlik as of the 30th of May 2022, show’s Wairarapa DHB’s 2 year old key milestone immunisation coverage remains stable compared to April 2022. The Total population coverage rate for 2 year olds is at 87%, Maori at 79% and Pacific at 100%. The target is 95%.

What we are doing

Work is underway by the Outreach Immunisation Service (OIS) with catch-up vaccination for two to five year olds who either had no dose or only one dose of Measles, Mumps Rubella (MMR) vaccination. These children have been identified and referred to OIS by the Immunisation Coordination Service. The Wairarapa DHB has provided additional support to OIS to manage the increased referral.

The Immunisation Coordination Service is also improving the process with medical centres for on-time referral to OIS to ensure that children can be followed-up by OIS in the community and given vaccination by their milestone age.

In addition, the Planning and Performance team continues to work with the Immunisation Coordination Service using the Qlik reporting platform to monitor coverage and identify projected opportunities to improve childhood immunisation coverage.

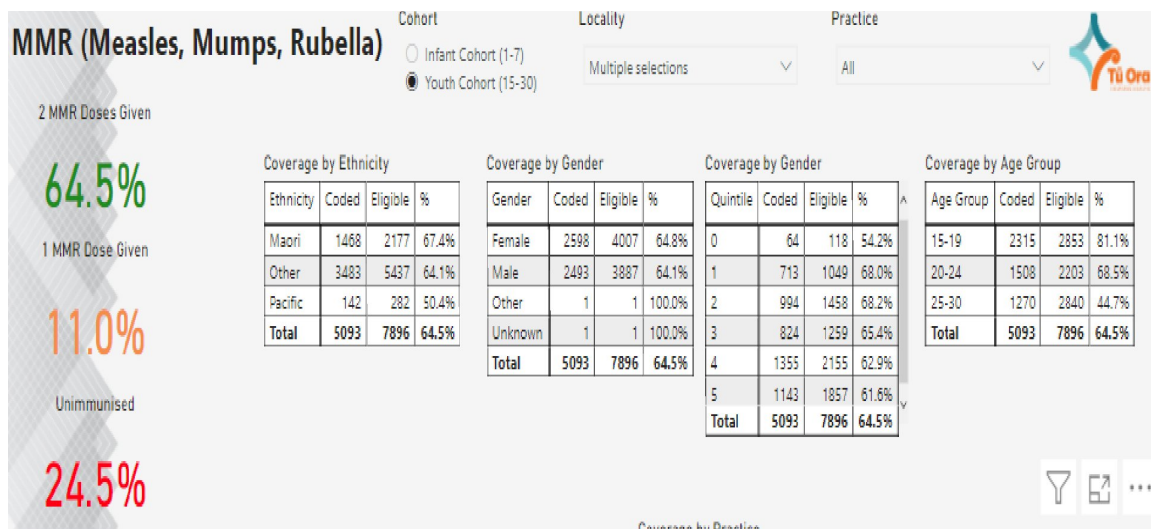
A whole of immunisation service approach will be undertaken in June 2022 through the Immunisation Operations Group (the Group) which has key stakeholders from Maori, Pasifika, service providers, Regional Public Health and the Immunisation Advisory Council. The Group’s first meeting will use recommendations from the Childhood Immunisation Service Hui held in February 2022 and the Service Providers Hui held in May 2022 to develop the immunisation strategy or approach for the Wairarapa for the next 12 months.

Following the development of the immunisation strategy, the Group will monitor progress, share successes, identify challenges and gaps within the service and work to improving equity for Maori and Pacific population.

2.2 Measles, Mumps and Rubella Youth 15-30 year olds

Data for May 2022, shows 64.5% of the Total eligible 15-30 year olds were immunised for MMR. The Māori youth cohort rate is 67.4% while Pacific is 50.4%. The 25-30 year old group have the lowest uptake at 44.7%.

What we are doing

A Pasifika MMR event was successfully organised in May 2022 where Pasifika communities were provided MMR vaccination and information. Following from that successful event, the Pacific Health Navigator and the Director of Pacific Peoples Health are working together to engage with 15 -30 year olds identified as needing MMR vaccination. A Youth approach is also being used with the Pasifika community to engage this age group.

The MMR Campaign Immunisation Coordinator is linking with medical centres to establish a process whereby an administrator within the MMR campaign programme would follow-up with eligible population on behalf of the practises to engage them for MMR vaccination.

Work is also underway by Tekau ma Iwa and Tu Ora to capture eligible Maori Population using the trusted relationship approach.

2.3 Influenza

Wairarapa DHB’s influenza campaign is well underway. As of the 28th of May 2022, Wairarapa flu vaccination rate has steadily increased with 61.8% of the total population aged 65 and over vaccinated; 54.8% of Maori and 63.0% of Pacific aged 65 and over also received their vaccine (see Figure 2 below). The target is 75%.

What we are doing

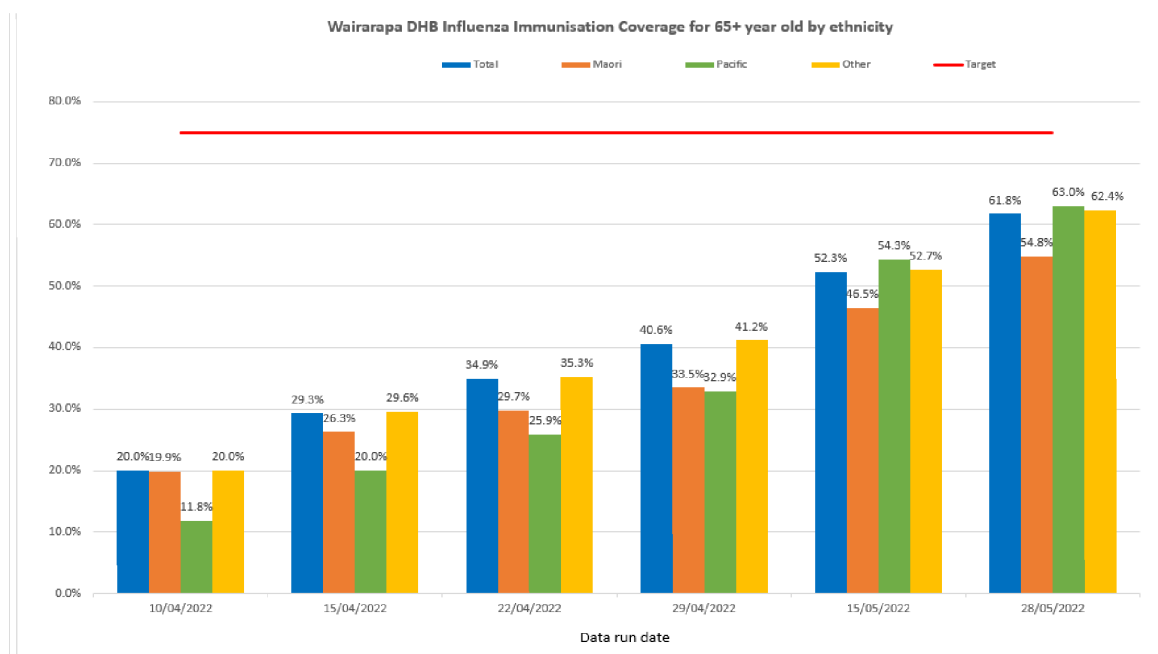
The DHB COVID-19 vaccination team is providing mobile outreach to deliver flu vaccine to eligible Pacific population through a collaborative approach with Pasifika o Wairarapa. This collaborative approach commenced in May 2022 and has improved the flu coverage rate for the Pacific population.

The DHB COVID-19 vaccination team continues to offer their vaccination workforce to communities and service providers in the Wairarapa to vaccinate population eligible for funded flu vaccine; MMR and COVID-19.

Maori health service providers are also working closely with Maori communities to plan and implement winter wellness initiatives that works for their whanau.

Community pharmacies continues to perform an important role in the delivery of flu vaccine, MMR and COVID-19 vaccine. Their involvement and willingness to support the delivery of immunisation service has improved access to vaccination and contributed greatly to the improvement in immunisation coverage for the Wairarapa.

2.4 COVID-19 Vaccination Programme

The COVID-19 vaccination programme roll out continues. All people over the age of 5 years are eligible.

As at 6 June 22 the Wairarapa sites have delivered 108,848 vaccinations. In February some of our local Pharmacies and Medical Centres began vaccinating. As at the 6 June 22 the Pharmacies and Medical Centres had delivered 6,305 vaccinations. Tekau Ma Iwa continues to deliver vaccinations and by 6 June 2022 had delivered 13,060 vaccinations.

Our population continues to sit at 96% (39,918 people vaccinated) for dose 1 and 95% (39,335 people vaccinated) for dose 2.

Our boosters and five to eleven year olds vaccinations statistics are shown in Figure 3. Wairarapa has vaccinated 74% of those eligible for a booster (26,628 people vaccinated) at 6 June 2022. We have vaccinated 52% of our five to eleven year old children (2,213 children vaccinated) as at 6 June 2022 for dose 1 and 20% for dose 2 (880 children vaccinated).
